Genesis 11:27-13:4 • Abraham and the Cycle of Faith

- (11:27-32) Partial obedience to God's Word and will can be costly in lost time and personal loss. Abram began to leave the old life as represented by leaving Ur, but he did not arrive at God's desired destination.
- 2. (12:1-3) How well do we trust God's <u>plan</u> for our life, and in the pursuit of that <u>path</u>, trust in His personal <u>work</u> in and for us? What might it take to get us to complete the <u>journey</u> we began from the old life in the <u>world</u> to the new one in <u>Christ</u>?
- (v.4-6) Our best <u>position</u> in this life is to be established on a firm <u>foundation</u> of <u>obedience</u> to God's Word and ways.
- 4. (v.7-9) We are to treat this life as a temporary <u>residence</u>, ready to go when and where God <u>directs</u>, and always engaging in our primary purpose where God is concerned—<u>worship</u>.
- (v.10) In the course of this life, our faith and trust in God will be tested. Regardless of how severe the circumstances, the answer is never to return to our old life.
- (v.11-13) <u>Sin</u> always leads to more <u>sin</u>; a single, unaddressed <u>compromise</u> in the direction of our old life ultimately <u>returns</u> us there completely.
- 7. (v.14-20) Biblical <u>faith</u> trusts and believes God regardless of the circumstances and never resorts to human <u>conniving</u> or worldly <u>craftiness</u>. It not only wreaks <u>damage</u> upon us personally, but in our Christian <u>witness</u> to the unsaved, who are often more <u>diligent</u> in these things than we are.
- 8. (13:1-4) Forgiveness and restoration do not automatically <u>erase</u> the <u>consequences</u> of our choices, especially those involving <u>sin</u>.

Conclusion:

(Heb. 11:8-19) It has been observed that the summary and legacy of Abraham's faith is...

- (v.8) He believed God even though he did not know where...
- (v.11) ...believed God even though he did not know how...
- (v.17-19) ...and believed God even though he did not know why.

This was born out of the viewpoint which was not merely a <u>doctrinal</u> statement, but something he <u>lived</u>, "having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth...they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one". (v.13-16)
