## Lamentations 2 • The Second Step of Acknowledgment

- 1. (v.1-3) Judgment on the backslidden may not be limited to a loss of the things of the <u>world</u>, but the <u>spiritual</u> as well. It's an indicator of how close one is coming to <u>losing</u> everything not just in this <u>life</u>, but the one to come.
- 2. (v.4-5) The Lord may turn all things against the backslidden if that is what it takes for them to <a href="acknowledge">acknowledge</a> their true spiritual <a href="condition">condition</a>.
- (v. 6-9) They had to be shown how their spiritual service and condition was completely <u>void</u> and <u>broken</u> by experiencing the literal things associated with that service being completely <u>voided</u> and <u>broken</u> by God Himself.
- 4. (v.10-12) The consequences of sin can have an extended <u>effect</u> to those around us. Part of the process God uses is to <u>force</u> the backslidden to face the <u>reality</u> not only of what they have done to <u>themselves</u>, but to <u>others</u> as well.
- (v.13-16) The situation for the backslidden is unlike any other human condition of <u>suffering</u> because it is brought about by willful <u>deception</u> where personal <u>sin</u> is concerned.
- 6. (v.17-19) Right spiritual acknowledgment is achieved when we ascribe to Him the <u>authority</u> and <u>source</u> behind the earthly <u>tools</u> of His judgment. This acknowledgement always first takes material shape in the form of sincere <u>repentance</u> from the <u>heart</u>.
- 7. (v.20-22) Forgiveness and spiritual <u>reconciliation</u> may be ultimately achieved but do not automatically mean that there are no continued <u>consequences</u> for sin.
