Amos 1-2 • The Reason for God's Judgment

- 1. (1:1-2) It begins with God sounding a warning through an <u>authentic</u> messenger.
- 2. (1:3-5) Even though they obviously violated God's <u>Law</u> where the worship of false gods is concerned, the primary charge God brings against them is their <u>treatment</u> of <u>others</u>.
- 3. (1:6-8) Even though they obviously never <u>worshiped</u> anything except their false gods, the primary charge God brings against them is their <u>treatment</u> of <u>others</u>.
- 4. (1:9-10) The primary charge God brings against them is their treatment of others and the personal covenant relationship they had entered into with others.
- (1.11-12) Even though they obviously violated God's Law where the worship of false gods is concerned, the primary charge God brings against them is their treatment of their blood relatives.
- 6. (1:13-15) The primary charge God brings against them is their treatment of others.
- 7. (2:1-3) The primary charge God brings against them is their treatment of others.

<u>Summary</u>: God's primary pronouncements against the nations center on their <u>treatment</u> of <u>others</u> far more than their <u>treatment</u> of <u>Him</u>. (See Jn. 13:34; Rom. 13:8-10; 1 Jn. 2:3-11)

- 8. (2:4-5) The primary charge God brings against them is not just forsaking God's <u>Word</u>, but making the worst possible <u>substitution</u> in its place.
- 9. (2:6-8) God's people are held more greatly accountable for their treatment of others because they had direct knowledge of

God's <u>requirements</u>. They are more <u>guilty</u> than everyone else around them.

<u>Summary</u>: Where God's people are concerned, the <u>treatment</u> of <u>others</u> can never be separated from their <u>treatment</u> of <u>Him</u> because of their having received His <u>Word</u> and having entered into a <u>covenant</u> relationship with Him.

10. (2:9-16) God's summary for His people:

- a. (v.9-10) God reminds them of what He accomplished on their behalf in the past to fulfill His Word.
- b. (v.11) God reminds them of what He provides on their behalf in the **present** to fulfill His **Word**.
- c. (v.13-16) God describes the ultimate <u>future</u> consequences for a lifestyle of <u>sin</u>.

Application: There is a point when a <u>breech</u> in one's relationship with God becomes so great that the only thing left is <u>judgment</u>. God proves a <u>breech</u> with Him by our <u>breech</u> with others.

Epilogue: The last judgment of the nations described as the separation of the sheep and goats in Matthew 25.
