2 Peter 1 • When Knowledge Matters

- (v.1-4) Knowledge is a gift that comes as part of the overall gift of <u>salvation</u> which is intended not just to change the <u>information</u> we know, but the way by which we conduct our <u>life</u>.
- 2. (v.5-11) Biblical knowledge is the application of biblical <u>truth</u> resulting in biblical <u>love</u>:
 - a. To "faith" is applied "moral excellence". Saving faith in Christ is supposed to so change us that we become visibly different by our advertisement of a life that lives according to biblical standards.
 - b. To "moral excellence" is applied "knowledge". True Christians are able to discern right from wrong.
 - c. To "knowledge" is applied "self-control" which leads to "perseverance". This is the "staying power" of the Christian in times of trial, someone whose faith is ultimately guided by reliance more on God's Word than earthly circumstances.
 - d. To "perseverance" is applied "godliness". The word "godliness" actually means "right worship". True Christians are known for worshipping not the things of this world but of Christ.
 - e. To "godliness" is applied "brotherly kindness". True Christians are proven by their changed relationships with others.
 - f. And finally to "brotherly kindness" is applied "love". This kind of wrapper for all of these virtues is not a "gift" or supernatural attribute, but the ultimate result of a life dedicated to God's Word and ways.

- g. Application: Whereas knowledge is initially bestowed as a gift at the initial process of <u>salvation</u>, it is expected that we **GROW** in knowledge so that <u>salvation</u> is proved by quality of the change our life testifies to both to ourselves and others.
- (v.12-21) Biblical knowledge is a gift which must be <u>put into</u>
 <u>practice</u> not only so that spiritual growth may result, but that
 we will build the correct <u>foundation</u> for our very life based on
 the <u>Word of God</u> and none other.
